REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

2 Kings 4: 42-44 Ephesians 4: 1-6 John 6: 1-15

There's never enough! As individuals, a nation, and even the world, we are led to believe the lie that there will never be enough...enough food, water, natural resources, even money. We are always in a toxic state of frenzy believing we need to hoard and covet because there will never be enough for all to have. This mind-set of scarcity was quite evident in the recent covid pandemic when our nation went on a buying frenzy of toilet paper thinking there wouldn't be enough for all. In today's readings, God shows us that not only will he provide enough, but he offers us an abundance of life and goodness. God, working miracles through his prophets Elisha and Jesus, provides a superabundance of what we truly need. Not only does God provide enough, but there is more than what is needed. What God asks of us is that we in turn share our gifts with those who have less. God asks us to come gather in unity, as a community of one united in the Trinity.

Our first reading from the second Book of Kings, relates this miraculous story about God feeding a hundred people through the prophet Elisha. The context of this story was that Jerusalem and the temple had been destroyed by Babylon. Both the southern and northern kingdom of Israel were overtaken, and the people were in despair. The author of Second Kings was writing to bolster their spirits through the hope of a messianic kingdom. Especially noteworthy is the fact that barley loaves used by the prophet Elisha were the food of the poor. That God favored the faithful poor is made clear in the feeding of the hundred men. As Christians we see in this story a prefigurement of Jesus' wonderful miracle in today's Gospel. Today's Gospel is from John Chapter 6, the Bread of Life discourse, and takes the place of Mark's Gospel for an interval of four weeks. From the first verses of today's reading, the evangelist John wants to put in our mind this correlation between the Jewish Passover-Exodus event and Jesus' feeding the five thousand. Jesus goes up the mountain, and this place is reminiscent of Sinai. Jesus' offering of himself is greater than the manna of the Old Testament. And while the manna in the dessert was sufficient food for a day, Jesus provided a surplus of bread and fish. It was also believed that when the messiah would come it would be a time of prosperity and plenty especially for the poor. In this miracle story, Jesus becomes the fulfillment of those messianic prophecies, and he provides an abundance of food for all.

When I reflect on this Gospel, I am struck by the fact that there is a surplus of barley loaves left over. In fact, the

text says that they had more than they could eat. God blesses us in our lives with more than we can ever hope for. His kingdom brings about enough for everyone. But for that miracle to reach its full impact, we must share with others from our surplus. The second reading today speaks of this oneness or unity found in the Church. In fact, seven times the author of Ephesians speaks of the blessings of unity...one body of believers with one hope, one faith, sharing one baptism in one Lord, belonging to one Father in one Spirit. We need to rediscover the power of one community, the Church, in order to share this abundance of God's love and life with a hungry world. If you would like to read more about this myth of scarcity, which I alluded into in the first paragraph, read the book "The Soul of Money" by Lynne Twist.
