# REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

Ezekiel 17: 22-24 2 Corinthians 5:6-10 Mark 4:26-34

Today after spending almost a quarter of the entire liturgical year in Lent and Easter and after delving into the mysteries of the Trinity and the Eucharist, we return to the regular Sundays in "Ordinary Time". So, we might ask ourselves how time can be ordinary. Considering that each day is a gift from God and our lives, with its blessings and sufferings, are in God's Providence...how can time be mundane or ordinary. In theological terms, "Ordinary Time" is not ordinary at all, but is the way we count the different Sundays using ordinal numbers. Using ordinal numbers, today we say is the 11th Sunday in Ordinary Time. But we must remember that all time is extraordinary or sacred, and God's hand is working mysteriously, almost imperceptibly, to bring about his kingdom. How will we be a part of God's providential plan?

In today's first and third reading, God uses botanical images to show how his kingdom is growing slowly and steadily toward fulfillment. In the first reading from Ezekiel, the prophet uses the image of a small portion of a cedar tree being lopped off and replanted in Jerusalem or on Mount Zion. Ezekiel is pointing to how God will bring his people out of the Babylonian captivity and restore them to their homeland. Secondly, the prophet is foretelling how someday in the future messianic kingdom, all nations will come to Israel and find shelter. The image Ezekiel uses is that "birds of every kind shall dwell beneath it". Israel will one day be the safe place where God will gather all peoples and nations. In today's third reading, we return to the proclamation of the Gospel of Mark. We will read from Mark until the end of the liturgical year except for a short hiatus to hear Chapter 6 of John's Gospel. Today's Gospel selection presents us with two parables about the kingdom. The first, unique to Mark, speaks about the man who plants and harvests but knows not how the seed grows, yet it yields first the blade, then the ear, and finally the grain. The second is about the small insignificant mustard seed that when fully grown is a large shrub that can shelter many birds. Both agricultural images point to how God's kingdom is always growing and reaching its fulfillment even though we might be unaware.

So, what is the message we need to take from these Scripture readings. Often, we become discouraged and don't believe we are progressing in our journey to God. Other times we wonder why God doesn't seem to work faster to bring about his plan. Maybe we've prayed for a particular thing and nothing seems to be

happening. It seems like God isn't listening to our prayers! We need to have hope and patience. God is working and his plan is coming to fruition although it is often a slow imperceptible process. Just like the mustard seed that seems so small eventually in God's time, this insignificant seed will become a great beautiful shrub. So, what does God want from us? He asks that we plant the seed and day-in and day-out do our little part to make sure the seed has the best growing conditions. He asks that we do our little part with consistency, perseverance, and trust in His providence. It's not that he wants us to be a doormat and do nothing. It's that he invites us to trust and put forth all that we have knowing that He is the one that controls everything. He wants us to see with the eyes of faith that nothing is out of his control. Nothing happens by chance! His guiding hand is leading us through all our days and making them not ordinary, but extraordinary.

# From the Desk of Fr. Damian: New Wedding Ritual The Power of Music

Music is vital to worship. Music helps us give praise to God and to hear God's message to us. This is not done with just any type of music. Secular music is designed to distract and to entertain. It is not designed to pull us out of ourselves or to focus us on Christ.

We use Sacred Music for the Mass and for the Sacrament of Marriage. Sacred Music unites us in love of God. "He who sings prays twice," St. Augustine says. Sacred Music helps us put words around our deepest thoughts and prayers. "For we do not know how we ought to pray, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groans too deep for words" as Paul tells us in Romans 8:26. This is true at a Sunday Mass. It is especially true at a Wedding.

To begin a life together is a serious thing. A Bride & Groom know they need the grace of the Sacrament to begin this great endeavor of life. We need the prayers of our family, our friends and our parish so that the foundation of our married life can be strong. Secular songs were not built to hold the sacred work of intercession and petition that needs to be done as a couple unites themselves before the Altar. But Sacred Music was. Sacred Music can lift up the couples hopes and fears to God. It can ask for Our Holy Mother to pray for them as they bring their life together. It can let us know that God blesses this marriage.
