REFLECTION FROM DEACON STEVE URBAN

1 Kings 19:4-8 Ephesians 4:30--5:2 John 6: 41-51

All of us in our lifetime have felt like Elijah in today's first reading. We are in a desert searching for answers as to why things seem so miserable. For some reason, our life is tormented by pain and suffering. We might even feel abandoned by God. In our human condition, we cry out, "This is enough, O Lord!" Like Elijah, we might even wish for death. God hears our cry like he heard Elijah. So he sent Elijah a messenger, an angel, to feed and refresh him so he could continue his journey. He does the same for us. Jesus, in today's Gospel. promises to give us not only bread, but living bread that will sustain us forever. This gift of bread is Jesus himself who promises eternal life. How often we despair about life and our human condition, but God gives us what we need if only we see and accept his gift. Following St. Paul's admonition, let's get rid of all bitterness, anger, malice and be kind, compassionate, and forgiving to one another.

Our first reading from 1 Kings finds the prophet Elijah fleeing for his life from King Ahab and his evil wife Jezebel. Elijah had killed the false prophets of Baal, and that angered Queen Jezebel who promised to kill Elijah. Afraid of the Queen and questioning his vocation as a prophet, Elijah gives up and wishes to die. God, however, sends his angel and feeds him with a hearth cake and guenches his thirst with water. Not once, but twice God sends his angel to feed him. Strengthened by food and drink, Elijah then journeys to the mountain of Horeb where God rekindles the fire within him. In our second reading, Paul reflects on another journey...our baptismal journey. This journey like Elijah's pilgrimage to Horeb is long, treacherous, and demanding. Worn out by bitterness, anger, malice, backbiting, we might feel like abandoning the journey. But St. Paul encourages us to follow Christ's sacrificial giving of himself and to be led by the Holy Spirit. Finally, in today's Gospel, which is a continuation of John Chapter 6 the Bread of Life discourse, Jesus promises to be the bread which gives eternal life. The Jews fail to believe because they know Jesus' upbringing and his parents Joseph and Mary.

Although Elijah was fed by the angel and Jesus gives himself as the bread of eternal life, that doesn't mean we still don't have to deal with the uncertainties, suffering, and evil of this world. God doesn't take us out of the world, nor take away sufferings and pain. Instead, God leads us through the pain and our problems with the food and refreshment we need. God shows us that he and he alone will walk with us on the journey and give us what we need to live. That's why we need the Eucharist and the Body of Christ, the Church, to strengthen us for the journey. More than ever before, we need each other gathering as Church to support, guide, encourage, and mostly challenge one another. Whether it's a bible study group, a prayer group, Cursillo, or some other entity, we must share our faith story and encourage one

another. But mostly, we have to turn to the Eucharist, the source and summit of our Catholic faith, to sustain us on the long journey. And to get the most out of the Eucharist, we have to prepare our hearts. With daily prayer, a thoughtful examination of conscience, works of charity, and a listening heart, we come to Eucharist being present to Jesus the Living Bread.
